- Argentina finished sixth at Rio 2016, suffering sudden-death extra-time time heartbreak against Great Britain in the quarter-finals
- Four veterans of Rio 2016 are selected in Germán Schulz, Santiago Álvarez, Rodrigo Etchart and Gastón Revol
- There are three of Argentina's Youth Olympic Games gold medallists from 2018 in the squad (Lucio Cinti, Marcos Moneta and Ignacio Mendy) and a silver medallist from 2014 (Lautaro Bazan Velez)
